Now, his father had grown up in the depression and as you can imagine that his faith in humanity was tanking as well. This was obviously before cell phones so they were getting themselves ready for the 10-mile hike back to town. But just at the moment they were getting ready to start walking, a young cowboy pulls up with a flatbed truck and said he would tow them into town.

All that his dad had on him was a Chevron gas card. Not exactly cash ready for something like this. And he kept telling the young cowboy that he couldn't pay him. To which he kept replying – I wasn't going to charge you. Now, of course, this would happen on a Sunday so nothing is open. The cowboy goes to his

The cowboy says to him – you know, I have a ton of watermelons that need to be loaded onto my truck. It's hard and sweaty work and I haven't been looking forward to doing it on my own. If you two help me with that, I will pay for your part. So, they get to work loading those watermelons and 90 hot and sweaty minutes later they are done with the job and the car comes rolling up purring like a kitten once again. His dad is satisfied with the exchange and he and his son go to get in the car and drive off after thanking the mechanic and the cowboy. And then the mechanic says, "Hey wait a minute."

Now dad froze, you could see all the fear and mistrust come to his face. He stiffened up like a leopard. But the mechanic said, "no no no, my wife is going to make us all Sunday dinner. I figured while she was doing that you two could get a shower and get cleaned up, get a new t shirt, get some dinner, and head out on the road in good shape." And so, they stayed and they got cleaned up and had fried chicken from the hens that were running just outside and corn from the field just 30 feet away. And it was good.

### **Altar Flower Change**

When the father and son said their goodbyes and made their way home, the dad turned to the son and said, "No matter what you see in the movies, or read in the papers, you listen to me – that's how people really are. And about a month later Neil Armstrong walked on the moon.

We have so conditioned ourselves to believe that the loudest voices we hear are the ones that define our generations. They only do if we let them. They only do if we allow ourselves to repeat those voices with our own. As Christians we are called to see the new humanity that God is creating – that God has made visible to us in Christ.

Sometimes I wonder what kind of offering Jesus needs from us today. What does the lord require of us, but to do justice, love kindness, and to walk humbly with God? I think it looks like responding to all things with this expansive image of God's love and mercy in our minds. I think it looks like responding to hate and intolerance with a perspective that the world cannot give. When the pain of the world surrounds us and confuses us - make sure that you focus on your little corner of it. You may not be able to change things on the world stage but you sure can treat your neighbor with love, kindness, and seek to understand each other. Maybe that kindness even looks like helping someone with a water pump. We are more than the loudest and angriest voices that try to steal our attention and manipulate our actions. Remember that when fear and anxiety are trapping your joy and generosity. It is never too late for God to do a new thing. And it is never too late for God to do a new thing through you.

# September 2021 Worship Schedule

September 5, 12, 19, 26

9:00 AM—Traditional Service 10:15 AM— Adult Sunday School 10:30 AM—Children's Sunday School (starting 9/12)

Below you will find all of the options for worship as well as what is required to participate. It is important that you keep this information handy.

In-person worship has resumed at 9:00 am. We are well aware that many of you will not feel comfortable resuming in-person worship. We respect that perspective and further we do not recommend participation in this service if you are in a vulnerable category. We will continue to make worship available in a variety of platforms so that anyone who wishes to worship will be able to do so.

In-Person worship reservations are no longer required. Adhering to current CDC guidelines for this type of gathering, all participants are required to wear a mask and adhere to social distancing. We will trust you to self-screen yourself before entering the building. If you are running a fever or feeling ill in any way – we ask that you stay home. Also, if you have been exposed to anyone with Covid-19 or to someone who is awaiting test results for Covid-19 we ask that you not enter the church building.

The parking lot door will be the only door open for entry and exit. As you enter you will pick up a communion packet and bulletin which will be laid out on a nearby table, and you will be seated in a

designated pew.

Please note that even as we try to keep the service as close to normal as possible, **there will be noticeable differences.** There will be limited congregational speaking and no singing.

After the service is over you will be dismissed by family group and asked to follow the signs leading you out of the building. We ask that any socializing happen outside with great attention paid to social distancing.

### Radio Worship Service:

There will be a radio broadcast of the service available to those who are parked just outside of the church, either in the parking lot or on the street. Just tune your radio to 88.5 and you can sing your heart out. Communion and bulletins will also be available for anyone who would like to participate. Just stay in your car and someone will bring these items to you.


### **Online Worship Service:**

Our online worship will continue to be available. As we begin in-person worship we will stream it through YouTube. You will still be able to find the service by going to the same website page that you have previously gone to https://www.trinityleb.org/links. Here you will find links to the live-stream, the bulletin, the replay of the service so that you can watch at any time you wish during the week.

Following the online service, drive-through communion will be available to anyone who would like it until 10:15 am. Pastor Gretchen will set up a distribution station on the Monument Park side of the church.






### Laboring for the Lord

For many people, the pandemic redefined work, with more employees logging hours from a home office — or kitchen table. Boundaries between job and personal life blurred, as did any sense of being "off duty."



Most of us prefer clear divisions between our tasks and time. While such separations may help with scheduling, they are artificial human constructs. "Whatever your task," says Colossians 3:23 (NRSV, emphasis added) — whether in public or private, family or job, spiritual or worldly activities — "put yourselves into it as done for the Lord." Verse 17 tells us to "do everything" in Jesus' name, "giving thanks to God the Father through him."

That means even work and worship interlock. As Rick Warren writes, "Work becomes worship when you dedicate it to God and perform it with an awareness of his presence."



### Learn from leaves

As you're enjoying the fall colors and sipping apple cider, ponder this saying: "Autumn shows us how beautiful it is to let things go."



When leaves stop producing chlorophyll, they turn vibrant shades of yellow, orange and red. This yearly spectacle makes way for the leaves to let go and fall. It also serves as a good reminder of things we may need to drop: clutter around the home, a desire for control, commitments that no longer bring joy, personal expectations that cause added stress, a need to always be right and so on.

Just as the Israelites had to let go of their past as slaves in Egypt and Saul-turned-Paul had to abandon his persecuting ways, we, too, can let go of what weighs us down and gets in the way of God's best for our lives. Embrace fall as a season of change and see just how beautiful it is to let things go!
